#### **Course Description:**

This class will introduce you to various aspects of German speaking peoples. You will be able to listen, speak, read, and write German at a beginning level. You will also be presented with Germanic Culture and lifestyle, as well as history, and current events. Topics we will study are basic introductions, means of transportation, free time activities, weather, family, and animals. We will also study geography, music, and the impact German speaking countries have on the world. Language learning is both an academic and a physical skill. Therefore, you will be expected to practice every day. Your individual efforts will reflect directly on your success in learning German.

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## **Course Objectives:**

During this course you will develop your language skills in the 5 C's; Communication, Cultures, Connections, Comparisons, and Communities. These are the state benchmarks. It is expected that you will be able to do the following at a beginning level.

- I can engage in conversations, provide and obtain information, express feelings and emotions, and exchange opinions.
- I can understand and interpret written and spoken language on a variety of topics.
- I can present information, concepts, and ideas to an audience of listeners or readers on a variety of topics
- I can demonstrate an understanding of the relationship between the practices and perspectives of Germanic culture.
- I can demonstrate an understanding of the relationship between the products and perspectives of Germanic culture.
- I can reinforce and further my knowledge of other disciplines through learning German.
- I can acquire information and recognize the distinctive viewpoints that are only available through the German language and its culture.
- I can demonstrate understanding of the nature of language through comparisons of German and English.
- I can demonstrate understanding of the concept of culture through comparisons of the German and American cultures.
- I can use German both within and beyond the school setting.
- I can show evidence of becoming a life-long learner by using German for personal enjoyment and enrichment.

#### Late Assignment Policy:

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## **Policy on Electronic Devices:**

Tools are allowed, toys are not! Striking the right balance and using them for an appropriate purpose demonstrates good judgment and responsible behavior. Therefore under handbook policy, here is how to correctly use your device in this class:

**First**, you must ask and gain permission from me <u>each time</u> you wish to use your device. I will ask what educational purpose you have in mind. This is also assuming it is done at an appropriate time. For example; while I am giving instruction is not an appropriate time, however while you are working independently is. If you do not gain permission - the standard policy of devices not being allowed is in effect.

- research from the internet for a specific task I have given you

Examples of inappropriate uses of technology are:

- texting
- photos
- playing games
- social purposes (including but not limited to email, facebook, twitter, etc.)
- listening to music
- searching the internet because you are bored

Not adhering to these will result in the consequences listed on page 18 of the student/parent handbook:
